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### HISTORY OF CCTU

ape Coast Technical University is a unique University that is committed to training of highly skilled human resource in Engineering, Built and Natural Environment, Applied Sciences and Technology, Applied Arts and Business, in close collaboration with industries and commerce. Cape Coast Technical University (CCTU), formerly Cape Coast Polytechnic was established in 1984 as a second cycle institution. In 1986, it operated under the Ghana Education Service (GES) to offer intermediary courses leading to the award of non-tertiary certificates.

Following the enactment of the Polytechnic Law (PNDCL 321) in 1992, the University was upgraded to a tertiary level to run programmes in various disciplines leading to the award of Higher National Diplomas (HND) in engineering, business and applied sciences and arts awarded by the National Board for Professional and Technician Examination (NABPTEX).

Currently, as a Technical Univer-

sity, and per the Technical Universities Act, 2016 (Act 922), as amended, in 2018 Act (Act 974), Cape Coast Technical University is mandated to provide higher education in Engineering, Applied Sciences and Arts, Technical and Vocational Education and Training and other related disciplines. The aim is to train students to be academically and technically balanced in order to match the challenges of the new century.

The University offers full-time Tertiary and Non-Tertiary programmes and has six (6) Schools which are made up of: School of Graduate Studies, School of Business and Management Studies, School of Applied Sciences and Technology, School of Applied Arts, School of Engineering and School of Built and Natural Environment. The Schools are each headed by a Dean and sub-divided into eighteen (18) academic departments. The University also has Directorates, Sections and Units which contribute to the teaching and learning processes.

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### INAUGURATION OF CAPE COAST TECHNICAL UNIVERSITY GOVERNING COUNCIL



CURRENT AFFAIRS

he Minister for Education, Dr. Yaw Osei Adutwum, on Tuesday, February 22, 2022 inaugurated an 18-member governing Council for Cape Coast Technical University during a short ceremony at the Ministry of Education in Accra. Preceding the administration of the Oath of Secrecy by the Minister for Education, the Chief Director at the Ministry of Education, indicated that the appointment was in accordance with section 5 of the Technical Universities Act (922) which states that "the Council shall be the governing body of the University" and that the following persons present for the inauguration have been appointed as such.

The Honourable Minister for Education, Dr. Yaw Osei Adutwum, administered the Oath of Secrecy and reiterated that the Council was appointed by the President in consultation with the Council of State and is mandated to steer the affairs of the university by providing strategic leadership, guidance and direction. In his remarks, the Honourable Minister for Education, commended the Council on their appointment and requested them to bring their ex-

pertise to bear on the development and the delivering of the Cape Coast Technical University mandate. He further indicated that members must be guided by the Oath of Secrecy in all their dealings and information that needed to be communicated must come from the Office mandated to do so. He remarked that if they really wanted to see Cape Cast Technical University as one of the best Technical Universities in Ghana and beyond



then members should eschew issues that create divisions since such things greatly affect development and progress of any institution. He categorically stated that the Government and for that matter the Ministry of Education is not interested in petty politics in the Council but rather interested to see Cape Coast Technical University becoming the best in its

category.

The Honourable Minister for Education, Dr. Yaw Osei Adutwum stressed that the role of the Technical Universities in the country is unique. The Technical Unversities serve as catalyst for growth and development and that explains why the government is really committed to the development of the Technical Universities in Ghana. He



opined that Cape Coast Technical University has to tell her stories for the world to know the achievements and capabilities and it is by this that the Government and donor agencies would come on board to help. He intimated that he had no doubt in his mind that when all efforts are strategically geared towards the goals of Cape Coast Technical University, the industrialization agenda of the country as well as the University becoming the innovation hub and centre of excellence would be achieved. The Minister for Education, Dr. Yaw Osei Adutwum further challenged Cape Coast Technical University to strategically put in place mechanisms to attract the best of students and also increase the student population. He was grateful that the Chairman of Council (Rev. Prof. Harold S. Amoono Kuofi), the Vice-Chancellor (Rt. Rev. Ing. Prof. J. D. Owusu-Sekyere) and the Registrar (Dr. Francis Narh Akrono) were still in the seat. Rev. Prof. Harold S. Amoono Kuofi, the Chairman of Council

The Chairman of Council added that the Council would prioritize its efforts to increase student population as well as bring on board industry driv-





sity as one of the noble institutions in Ghana located in Cape Coast had its matriculation ceremony on Friday, March 11 to formally receive freshmen and women admitted in the 2021/2022 academic year.

The University received a total number of 2,103 applications and out of this number, 1,899 were offered admission to pursue their programmes of choice. Records indicated that 1, 402 of the number offered admission registered as students. The Breakdown were bachelor of Technology 601, Higher National Diploma 453 and Professional Diploma and Diploma students 348. Of the number enroled 640 were males representing 45.6% whiles 762 were females representing 54.4%.

### CCTU COUNSELLING UNIT ORGANISES STUDY HABIT SEMINAR FOR THE STUDENTS



he Counselling Unit of Cape Coast Technical University has been organizing Study Habit Seminar to assist students to develop healthy habits towards their academic work on departmental basis. The Head of the Counselling Unit, Dr. Mrs. Esther Boham in his opening remarks indicated that

students often arrive ill-prepared for studying at university where teaching regularly takes place in large class sizes, where students are taught by staff who are involved in a variety of other roles in addition to teaching, and where the emphasis is on independent learning. She further said studies by Murtagh, 2010 indicated that the transition from the highly controlled, teacher-driven learning environment of high schools to university, where the student is responsible for their own learning, is perhaps the biggest chal-



lenge for the first year students. At the Seminar students were taken through ten (10) sections of the Study Habit Profile, namely allotment of time, assignment, concentration, consultation, corrections, procedure in study, reading and library use, written works and taking examinations. Dr. Mrs. Boham explained to the students what time allotment means, the courses that need much focus to getting the best and also advised them on how efficient and effective their time should be used other than spending time on seemingly unnecessary things as well as do their assignment on time. She further said some of

the students easily are attracted to their phones, television and other activities such as chatting (WhatsApp, Facebook etc.). Thev advised them avoid thinas

that would distract them when studying because the purpose for being on campus was to study and acquire knowledge. Dr. Mrs. Boham advised them to consult their friends when they don't understand some aspect of a lecture and indicated it was more shameful to consult a friend in an examination room which amounts to examination malpractice.

The speaker said the students should do further reading or studying beyond what the lecturer gives to them. They were further encouraged to plan whatever they want to study

and try answering questions after the end of every chapter or a section of a book they read. Students were advised to often visit the library and developed a habit of going to the library. Regarding examination, the students were en-

couraged to prepare very well before going to the examination center as well as plan out their points properly to answer questions in an examination. Students were then made to complete an inventory and they were taken through the scoring and interpretation. In the end they became aware of the areas they needed to work on.

In her concluding remarks, Dr. Mrs. Boham, recommended that, students should let the primary purpose of coming to the university be the driving force and helping them to get the best out of it. They should also respect one another and encouraged them to live a responsible life on campus.

### REPORT ON STAKEHOLDERS' WORKSHOP FOR CUR-RICULUM CO-DEVELOPMENT HELD ON THE **5TH APRIL**, **2022 AT THE JOHN BORSAH LIBRARY CONFERENCE ROOM, CAPE COAST TECHNICAL UNIVERSITY (CCTU)**



he School of Applied Sciences and Technology on 5TH APRIL, 2022 held a stakeholders' workshop at the John Borsah Library Conference Room to develop a curriculum for a newly proposed four-year



(B-Tech) program for the Hospitality industry. Prof. Rita Sanful, the Dean of the School of Applied Sciences and Technology, gave a short address by declaring the purpose of the workshop.



In his welcome address, the Vice-Chancellor of the Cape

Coast Technical University (CCTU); Rt. Rev. Ing. Prof. Joshua Danso Owusu-Sekyere expressed his utmost appreci-



ation to all the members for honouring the invitation to the workshop. He encouraged all dignitaries to put in their utmost best to make history of this program. The Carnegie Fellow, Prof. Roselyn Okech in her opening remarks, touched on developing curriculum for Technology in the Hospitality Industry. She said it is important to gain knowledge and information, this she cited a quote by the late Hon. Kofi Annan "Knowledge is power, Information is liberating. Education is the premise of progress, in every society and in every family". She affirmed that to be successful in any hospitality program we needed to look at our growth, successes, failures and challenges from time to time. Every Industry should look at these three keys; What, Why and How. What: identifying the need of the Industry. Where we can improve, what the challenges are, where we are doing well etc. We need to stay current in the industry. Why: knowing the importance of that need and, How: how is it going to be achieved.

She mentioned that in the hospitality industry, there is the catering aspect as well as the technology aspect. She opined that in Ghana, the technology aspect was yet to be developed.



Prof. Roselyn Okech advised the stakeholders that in developing the curricular for the proposed programs they should consider the technology as well.

The stakeholders were grouped



into two namely, the F & B Group (Food and Beverages) and the Food Production Group. The F & B group developed curriculum for four-year B-Tech program specially designed for the hospitality industry taken into consideration the technology aspect. The curriculum was designed such that at every level students would be awarded certificate. With this system, students have the option to continue to the next level of the programme or otherwise. The levels are: Waiter (Level 100) qualifies for Certificate, Head Waiter/Shift Captain (Level 200) qualifies for Diploma, Deputy/Assistant Restaurant Manager (Level 300) qualifies for Higher National Diploma and Restaurant Manager (Level 400) qualifies for Bachelor's



Degree (B-Tech). At each level students would offer computer and communication skill courses in addition to the hospitality courses.

The food production group also

developed curriculum for the level of an Executive Chef (EC)/ (GM) General Manager for food production. This is also a fouryear B-Tech program specially designed for the hospitality industry especially for Chefs. The programmes had been designed such that students would be awarded certificate at each stage of the programme. Computer and communication skills courses would be offered at each level. Student(s) have the option to continue to the final year level or otherwise. The levels starting from



level 100: Commis Chef (Level 100), graduate at the Certificate level, Chef de partie (Level 200) graduate with a Diploma, Sous Chef (Level 300) graduate with a HND, and finally, the Executive Chef (Level 400) which graduate with a Bachelor's Degree (B-Tech).






